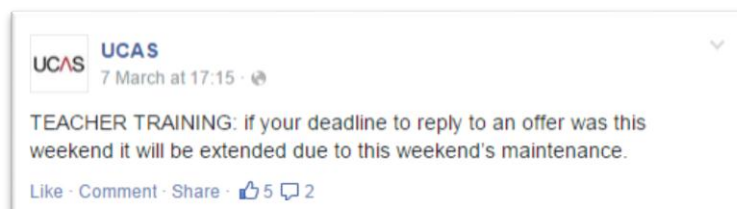
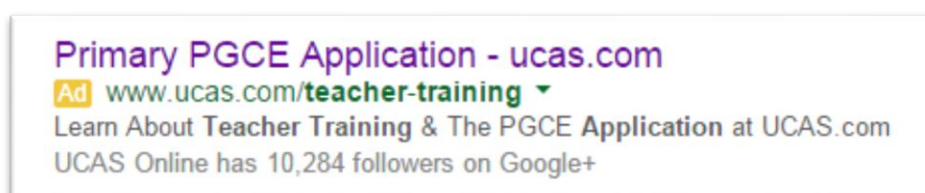


We are continuing to promote UCAS Teacher Training through:

Just because you're not holding an offer at the moment, it doesn't mean it's the end of the line for your plan to become a teacher. Your application for a training programme can still continue if you use our Apply 2 service – over 4,000 people did last year.

Apply 2 is a bit different to when you first made your application, as you can only apply for one training programme at a time. But apart from that the process is pretty much the same. It might be worth you taking a look at different options this time. Last year, candidates who were more flexible about their choice of route or training programme were more likely to secure a place.

Look at the different training programme

You don't have to apply for the same subject or age range as your original application. In Apply 2, you can change both the subject and age range if you want.

Look at the different routes into teaching

You may have applied for a programme closely aligned to your degree subject, but there could be some flexibility here. For example if you are interested in applying for an English PGCE, you might have a chance in English literature.
